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HEALTH

Health & Wellbeing is one of the most important of the Sustainable Development Goals (SDG's) and one we take very seriously.

Statistically, people in Indonesia have an average lifespan of 67 years. Children in rural areas and under the age of 5 suffer a myriad of health issues, most of which are the cause of stunted growth. A large percentage of these illnesses are a result of a lack of immunizations and are completely avoidable.

In an effort to encourage better health practises in our community, we have introduced child nutritional programmes and health services to 10 villages bordering our concession.

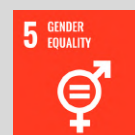
BOAT

It has quickly become apparent that in order to be able to provide a better service on a consistent basis, we would need an effective mode of transport that would enable us to reach the more remote villages in our project area, taking all necessary equipment, medication and expertise from village to village on a rotational basis.

In a wetland community, boats are naturally the best form of transportation.

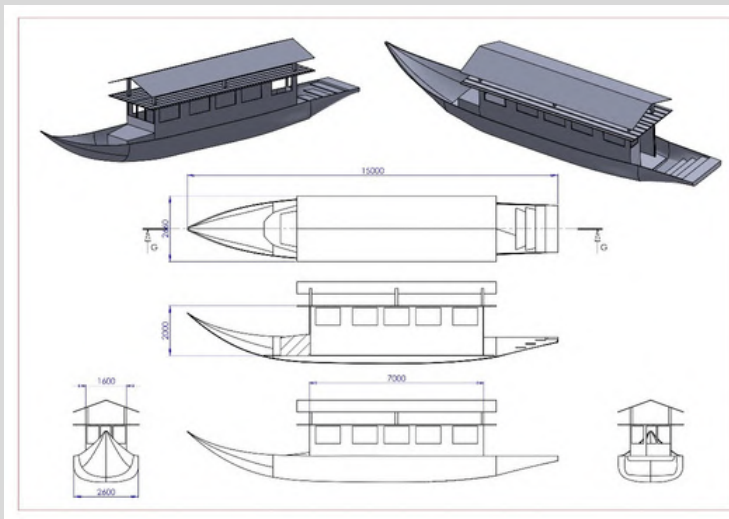
GOAL

A floating clinic will allow us to supply necessary rural health services which have been inaccessible and unaffordable in the Seruyan district, particularly for villages located on the Seruyan River which have limited road access. Women and children benefit most by having necessary access to medical care, while minority groups receive health services they would not otherwise be able to afford.





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HISTORY

The 'Floating Clinic' initiative was introduced in 2016. In 2017 we built the frame of the boat and this process took some time thanks to the remoteness of the area and the lack of building materials. There is a need for additional funding in order to purchase medications and equipment and to staff the boat.

In addition to the continuation of our nutritional programme, there will be family planning and prenatal services. Villagers will also be able to benefit from regular health educational outreach programmes which will focus on providing information to village constituents with a focus on 'Best Health Practices'.

CHALLENGES

Floating Clinic Health Services- Poverty and lack of sufficient hygiene lead to illness with little to no government health services. Initially the local Government was reluctant to partner with us, likely feeling territorial about the role and responsibility to provide healthcare throughout the district.

We established that the village health programs were rarely, if ever, staffed and had insufficient medical supplies. Through our outreach programmes, we successfully convinced our government partners that the Floating Clinic is able to assist in reaching people in remote areas, thus enabling them to be more effective and efficient. This helped us establish a partnership in health services.

This initiative requires good communication between us, government entities and community stakeholders.



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WHO WILL BENEFIT?

The following villages have inadequate access to ground or water transportation therefore it is very important to improve the availability of health services in each village.

8 of the 10 villages bordering Rimba Raya will have extensive benefits from this health initiative, the remaining 2 villages already have health centres or easy access to one.

The floating clinic provides a vital service to the elderly, who have difficulty making the long and arduous trip to the nearest health centre. Pregnant women and young children will receive the medical care they need. Rugged terrain and lack of useable roads mean it will also be useful as a water ambulance in emergencies. There are plans to deliver food packages, with particular focus on the nutritional requirements of children aged 12 and under.

A section of the boat will include a travelling library and reading programs will be offered to villages which do not yet have a permanent library.

The boat may also transport recycling from these remote villages, an endeavour which certainly contributes to our goal of protecting the environment.

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AT A GLANCE

Having partnered with the Seruyan Health Department and The Family Planning Agency we will be able to provide medical staff, basic health equipment and coordinate with health officials in each village.

The floating clinic will provide:

1. Public health services, including transportation of midwives to villages, medical equipment & basic medication.
2. Environment & health awareness building campaigns which can move from village to village for a greater reach.
3. Emergency health transportation.
4. Distribution of basic nutritional necessities, particularly for young children and the elderly.





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We conducted two Health outreach programmes in 2019 and will conduct one in each quarter of 2020.
